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PCN work in the Cancer Conference

Cancer Support Worker (CSW) pilot update

GM Cancer Alliance are piloting the role of the Cancer Care Coordinator (CCC) across nine Primary Care Networks to support new ways of working. This boundary spanning role will enable seamless delivery of personalised care to ensure patients feel supported and empowered.

As part of the pilot, the nine CCC have attended a training day to ensure they have the same baseline knowledge and have a practical toolkit to enable quality cancer care reviews to be conducted. Additional education on, communication skills, LGBT training and webinars on cancer basics are being completed to ensure the Cancer Care Coordiantors feel confident and knowledgeable in their new roles.

The first quarterly report will be issued in September to provide a progress report on the CSW pilot and Louise Retout will be delivering an update at the Early Diagnosis Steering Group on 4th October 2022 under the workforce and education item.

Primary Care Cancer Forum in November

Following the success of the April face to face education event on lung, gynae, non-site specific, lower GI and HPB cancers, we are now organizing a primary care education event on the 30th of November at etc venues, Manchester City Centre.

We are planning on holding sessions with expert speakers on the early diagnosis of skin, breast, head and neck, brain and haematology cancers. More information will be released soon.

Faecal Immunohistochemistry Testing reminder

Thank you to our PCNs for the work you have done to increase the use of FIT in the LGI referral pathway. Please continue to use FIT for high and low risk referrals as previously discussed. Please also continue to use the patient FIT leaflets.

There have recently been some British Society of Gastroenterology Guidance released which recommend FIT before referral in all suspected referrals for lower GI cancer except those with rectal/anal masses or ulceration. These guidelines will be adopted in Greater Manchester at some point but at present there are no changes to the referral pathway. We will notify you of any changes to the pathway in the future.
